Who is Greg Wong?

Greg Wong, a 22-year Navy veteran, is the current Director of the Nuclear Regional Maintenance Department (NRMD) at Subase New London and the Chairman of the Groton Electric Boat Veterans Network (EBVN).

During his Navy career, Greg served on USS Whale (SSN 638), USS Orion (AS 18), USS Tunny (SSN 682), USS Batfish (SSN 681), USS Jefferson City (SSN 759), USS Helena (SSN 725), Historic Ship Nautilus (SSN 571), USS Alexandria (SSN 757) and USS Hartford (SSN 768).

During the 15 years he has worked at Electric Boat, he has held positions of increasing responsibility in the nuclear organization. Greg started at EB as a Shift Test Engineer (STE) and rapidly qualified in multiple reactor plants. He was the Category I STE for the most complex nuclear testing performed at EB. He then joined Nuclear Ship's Management as an Area Superintendent during which period he gained valuable experience in Virginia Class Ship (VCS) new construction projects. After supporting three VCS projects, Greg was promoted to the

Nuclear Construction Project Manager of Nuclear Test Operations (NTO). After successfully supporting both new construction and maintenance and modernization projects, Greg was promoted to Manager of Nuclear Operations (Overhaul and Repair) where he managed the nuclear work during the USS Montpelier (SSN 765) Interim Dry Docking (IDD). Following that Greg was assigned to the NRMD as the Director where he and his team support the warfighters stationed there.

When not at work Greg enjoys golf, scuba diving, traveling, ethnic cooking and spending time with his daughter.

Why do you like working at Electric Boat?

Spending 22 years aboard submarines has shown me that the U.S. has the most capable, resilient, and technologically advanced boats in the world. Our subs are the gold standard and there is pride in building and maintaining the "best in the world" of something.
